During the half-mandate 2020-2023, the overarching priority for the NAT Section was to deliver on the European Green and Social Deal as a means to achieving sustainable recovery, the implementation of the Agenda 2030 and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). As you will read in the <u>NAT report</u> published in this newsletter, we focused in particular on fostering

a **fairer and more sustainable food supply chain**, a resilient and sustainable **agriculture** sector, vibrant **rural areas** and **biodiversity** protection across the various domains of section competence.

This period was a **challenging time**, leading to more conflicts, social injustice, cost of living crisis and climate devastation while the world was still bearing the consequences of the Covid pandemic. Yet, it was also an **opportunity to demonstrate civil society's resilience, generosity and engagement**, and the importance to face these challenges in solidarity.

I am particularly proud that, at times of multiple crises, we have continued and multiplied our efforts to **uphold the objectives of the European Green Deal and the UN Agenda 2030 on sustainable development**. We have had a meaningful impact and received important recognition through our various activities, also thanks to the close cooperation with the other Sections/CCMI and with the other NAT bodies, of which you will find the end of mandate reports here: <u>Sustainable Development Observatory</u>; <u>Permanent Group on Sustainable Food</u> <u>systems</u>; <u>Ad-hoc group on climate</u>.

Most importantly, across all of our work, we have **promoted and amplified the voices of young people**, offering them a space to engage meaningfully in climate and sustainability discussions - via dedicated Youth Round Tables, by including a youth delegate in the COP delegation and by involving young people regularly in our legislative work. **Youth is our present and our future: we must and we will continue to listen to their precious views and expertise.** 

All of this we could only manage thanks to the **dedication and commitment of the** <u>NAT</u> <u>Members</u> and <u>brilliant secretariat</u>, jointly working together in a true team spirit.

As we look ahead to the next half-mandate, I am **honoured to have been re-elected as new NAT President** and look forward to continue working with NAT Members and in particular with the **new and re-newed** <u>members of the NAT Bureau</u>.

The **multiple and interlinked global crises** we are facing – the COVID-19 pandemic, the climate and biodiversity emergencies, the cost of living crisis and the impacts of the conflict in Ukraine and elsewhere – will continue to affect the work of the NAT Section. Against this background, the **following main policy areas** will remain particularly relevant and challenging in the next months and years:

- Accelerating the implementation of the SDGs
- Promoting climate neutrality and developing the social dimension of the green transition
- Fostering circular economy towards a circular society

- Fostering the transformation to more sustainable and fairer agri-food systems
- Restoring and preserving natural capital Healthy planet for healthy people
- Implementing a holistic strategy towards sustainable rural/urban development

I am hopeful that transformative change towards a better, more sustainable and fairer future is still possible – for the current and next generations. In the next half-mandate, we should continue our efforts and commitment to demonstrate that through our work we can indeed make a difference.
